South Korea (Ages 13-15) Global Youth Tobacco Survey (GYTS)



FACT SHEET

The South Korea GYTS includes data on prevalence of cigarette and other tobacco use as well as information on five determinants of tobacco use: access/availability and price, exposure to secondhand smoke (SHS), cessation, media and advertising, and school curriculum. These determinants are components South Korea could include in a comprehensive tobacco control program.

The South Korea GYTS was a school-based survey of students in grades 1, 2, and 3 conducted in 2008.

A two-stage cluster sample design was used to produce representative data for South Korea. At the first stage, schools were selected with probability proportional to enrollment size. At the second stage, classes were randomly selected and all students in selected classes were eligible to participate. The school response rate was 97.3%, the class response rate was 100.0%, the student response rate was 96.0%, and the overall response rate was 93.5%. A total of 5,305 students aged 13-15 participated in the South Korea GYTS.

Prevalence

26.1% of students had ever smoked cigarettes (Boy = 31.3%, Girl = 20.3%)

13.0% currently use any tobacco product (Boy = 14.9%, Girl = 10.6%)

8.8% currently smoke cigarettes (Boy = 10.8%, Girl = 6.3%)

6.2% currently use other tobacco products (Boy = 7.2%, Girl = 5.0%)

20.1% of never smokers are likely to initiate smoking next year

Knowledge and Attitudes

14.3% think boys and 9.1% think girls who smoke have more friends 6.6% think boys and 2.6% think girls who smoke look more attractive

Access and Availability - Current Smokers

9.8% usually smoke at home

24.6% buy cigarettes in a store

18.9% who bought cigarettes in a store were NOT refused purchase because of their age

Exposure to Secondhand Smoke (SHS)

37.6% live in homes where others smoke in their presence

70.8% are around others who smoke in places outside their home

82.2% think smoking should be banned from public places

83.3% think smoke from others is harmful to them

54.8% have one or more parents who smoke

10.1% have most or all friends who smoke

Cessation - Current Smokers

66.1% want to stop smoking

77.1% tried to stop smoking during the past year

Media and Advertising

87.9% saw anti-smoking media messages, in the past 30 days

64.4% saw pro-cigarette ads on billboards, in the past 30 days

50.6% saw pro-cigarette ads in newspapers or magazines, in the past 30 days

7.4% have an object with a cigarette brand logo

18.0% were offered free cigarettes by a tobacco company representative

School

67.2% had been taught in class, during the past year, about the dangers of smoking

17.3% had discussed in class, during the past year, reasons why people their age smoke

61.2% had been taught in class, during the past year, the effects of tobacco use

Highlights

- 13.0% of students currently use any form of tobacco; 8.8% currently smoke cigarettes; 6.2% currently use some other form of tobacco.
- SHS exposure is moderate –
 nearly 2 in 5 students live in
 homes where others smoke, and
 7 in 10 are exposed to smoke

 home; more than half of the
 students have at least one parent
 who smokes.
- Four in 5 students think smoke from others is harmful to them.
- Over eight in 10 students think smoking in public places should be banned.
